

## **FESSH Travel Award 2019**

## Visiting Fellowship Queen Elizabeth Hospital Birmingham Brachial Plexus and Peripheral Nerve Surgery May 13 - June 09 2019

Sponsored by the FESSH Travel Award I had the opportunity to visit the brachial plexus and peripheral nerve team at Queen Elizabeth Hospital in Birmingham UK. The division is one of the biggest hand units in the UK including 14 fully trained hand surgery consultants and several hand fellows and an outstanding hand therapy team. The brachial plexus and peripheral nerve team is led by Mr. Dominic Power and Mr. Simon Tan, two highly experienced hand surgeons. My personal fellowship supervisor was Dominic Power. He is not only an outstanding hand and reconstructive surgeon but also a dedicated teacher in brachial plexus and peripheral nerve surgery. Moreover, he introduced me to the whole hand unit and also spent a lot of time with me outside daily business in the hospital. Hence, Dominic does not only give you insights into his deep knowledge of nerve surgery but is also capable of sharing a lot of cultural and historical knowledge with his visitors. I was able to scrub and assist in a broad variety of brachial plexus and peripheral nerve surgery as well as the whole spectrum of orthopedic and traumatic hand surgery. As a visiting fellow, you are allowed to join all the consultants (there are up to 4 trauma or elective lists running parallel every day) and learn from their great experience. The following are some of the procedures I was able to assist and observe during the fellowship period:

- Triple transfer for adult upper brachial plexus injury
- Median nerve reconstruction at wrist and forearm with allograft
- Radial nerve reconstruction with sural nerve
- Schwannoma enucleation of median, ulnar and radial nerve
- SPIN transfer for lower brachial plexus injury
- Peroneal nerve decompression
- Tarsal tunnel release
- Thoracic outlet decompression (supraclavicular approach)
- Carpal and cubital tunnel release (open technique)
- Microvascular 2nd toe-to-hand transfer after traumatic thumb loss
- ALT flap for forearm reconstruction
- Multidigital saw injury with flexor tendon, digital nerve and vessel repair
- Thumb replantation
- Digitial revasc after subtotal amputation
- Wrist fractures (volar, dorsal or combined approaches)
- Metacarpal and finger fractures (ORIF, CRIF)
- ORIF of transscaphoid perilunate fracture dislocation

In particular, I would like to thank Mr Dominic Power, Mr Samuel George, Mr Simon Tan, Mr Tahseen Chaudry and Mr Thomas Madura for their outstanding hospitality during my fellowship. The conceptual discussions about peripheral nerve surgery have been inspiring in many ways and clearly enhanced my understanding and treatment of nerve conditions. The nerve fellowship at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital in Birmingham is a highly recommendable experience.

Furthermore, I would like to thank FESSH for giving me the opportunity to expand my knowledge on brachial plexus and peripheral nerve surgery.


